Espacio artists pay homage to Virginia Woolf for Women's History Month



A group of East London-based artists will be celebrating Women's History Month by exhibiting their personal responses to Virginia Woolf's essay 'A Room of One's Own'.

Members of Espacio Gallery on Bethnal Green Road have taken inspiration from the essay, which states that 'a room of one's own and money in one's pocket' are essential to women's creative freedom.

Written more than eighty years ago, A Room of One's Own is based on a lecture given by Woolf to students at a Cambridge College, and includes her thoughts on education, marriage, money and property.

She casts a critical and humorous eye over the history of women's literature, ending in a passionate call to her readers, encouraging them to embrace their creativity.

These twelve Espacio artists – both male and female - have responded to her call by producing work across a number of different media in homage to the great author herself.

Espacio Gallery was opened last year by a group of artists who wanted a space of their own designed to meet their needs. It hosts exhibitions, talks and events.

Laura Bello, one of the organisers of the exhibition, said:

"Women's History Month celebrates the contribution that women have made to society. Virginia Woolf played an important role in feminism - fighting for women's artistic freedom.

"In 'A Room of One's Own', Virginia Woolf urges readers to 'open their minds and throw themselves into creative endeavour'. She's inspired us to do just that in her honour. We like to think that she'd be happy with the results!"

Stephanie Brunton

Stephanie is fascinated by portraiture and works full time as a painter and film maker. She also has a musical background.

She is fascinated by faces, which she believes tell the story of the person they belong to and her paintings often involve an investigation into the identity of people. Her films are about places and emotions that they evoke.

Lisa Kreuziger

German-born Lisa works within the spectrum of abstraction and her works are mainly influenced by Abstract Expressionism.

Her main objective involves trying to find the balance between intuition and conscious intent and this determines they way she composes paintings. This applies to her latest series of abstract cityscapes SunCity.

Valerie G.Montgomery

Valerie has an MA in fine art from City & Guilds of London Art School. She shows her work at Great Western Studios in London, and recently participated in The Big Vibe Affair show at the Vibe Gallery in Brick Lane, London.

She is currently working in acrylic, spray paint, glitter and crystals on canvas.

Argentinian-born Nora is a fashion and textile designer whose work took her to an interest in painting. She studied with Argentinian artist Cristina Dartiguelongue exploring colour interactions, using this as a means to express moods and rhythm.

The images were generated by spontaneous gesture-driven brushwork, transparencies and the superposition of layers. The dripped-paint technique evokes melancholic memories mixed with future expectations.

Kat graduated from Southampton Solent University with a First Class Honours degree in Make-up and Hair Design. Her favourite form of expression is to use the body as a canvas to create challenging looks and is passionate about new techniques and products.
